A Secret from the Grave

It is often said that many secrets go with someone to the grave. In this instance, however, the grave gave up its secret!

On 4th August, 1926 my uncle married a woman named Vera Edwards by license at the Presbyterian Manse, Chiltern.

The marriage certificate shows Vera Edwards was a waitress, a spinster and was living at the time in Faithfull Street, Wangaratta. Her place of birth was shown to be Harrismith, South Africa. I had been told that she had been born in Bloemfontaine, but researching her under this name in either place yielded no information at all.

After her death, it was discovered that her real maiden name was Violet Maud Gibb, born in Bloemfontaine, South Africa. Searching under this new name

revealed that she had been married to a man by the name of Tuckett, and had a family of 3, a girl and two boys.

It appears Violet (or Vera as she was here) left the Tuckett family, taking her daughter with her. The daughter was about 5 years of age when Violet (Vera) remarried, and had a further 2 daughters to her new husband.


Tantalisingly, I have recently been given a newspaper cutting dated November, 1946 relating to a solicitor in Leongatha, Victoria who was looking for a Violet Maud Tuckett!

Dunlop v Dunlop

While on the subject of bigamy, a second and more widely reported case occurred in Wangaratta itself.



On 18 April, 1855 this marriage took place in Wangaratta. Robert Dunlop, a native of Stewarton, Kilmarnock, Ayrshire, Scotland arrived in the colony in 1853. He commenced in business in Melbourne, but when gold fever came to Beechworth, he headed to the Woolshed. He worked as a barman at the Sunbury Hotel, then leased the hotel from his employers. When mining declined at the Woolshed, Dunlop opened a store at Chiltern, before rejoining his former employer in a store called Dunlop and Learmonth in Wangaratta (on the site of the Harp and Erin Hotel).

In about 1874, this enterprising man opened his own hotel and store at Oxley, where he remained until his death in 1889. By that time, the hotel had been leased to a man named Elias Martin.

The bride, Mary Henderson, had declared herself a spinster at the time of her marriage to Dunlop. Life went smoothly until Mary met up with a former acquaintance, James Kyle, who was surprised to see her in Australia. The last time he had spoken to her was in Scotland,

where he knew her as Mrs. Henderson, the wife of a William Henderson, who she had married in Kilmarnock in 1844.

According to the evidence obtained from Scotland, William Henderson was a drunken good for nothing who had enlisted in the army, was bought off, then went to New York taking his wife with him, before returning without her. He enlisted in the East India Company, deserted, gave himself up and was sent to India. He was invalided from India and sent back to Scotland about 1853. His wife returned to Scotland too, but lived with her mother until she left for Australia. Henderson lived with his mother until his death in 1863.

It seems that Mary was fleeing a life of hardship and abuse, saddled with a useless, work shy, hard drinking husband, and hoped that by travelling to the other side of the world she could start a new life. She was fortunate to marry a canny, hardworking man with a flair for business, and she knew that should her secret be found out, her world would come crashing down around her. In fact, she had asked James Kyle "not to try and do her any harm."

Robert Dunlop had several times been concerned about the rumours surrounding his wife, but she had reassured him that it was not so. When Dunlop obtained evidence confirming the rumours, he left his wife but gave her £700 and £200 worth of furniture.

Before federation, Australian laws governing divorce were derived from British law. After the 1857 Divorce and Matrimonial Causes Act, each state or colony had its own divorce laws, which were uniform with the mother country. Victoria introduced its first divorce legislation in 1861, based on the British Act. Inequity in grounds for divorce was the same as the British model, where a man only needed to prove one single act of adultery, while a woman would have to prove repeated adultery, or adultery coupled with incest or cruelty. The divorce case was heard in the Victorian Supreme Court with the divorce granted by His Honour, Mr. Justice Williams on 19th March, 1874.

relict of the late David Donald, formerly of
Oxley.

On 17th August, 1874 Robert Dunlop married Agnes Donald, widow of David Donald of Oxley. Suffice to say, he was making sure there were no husbands lurking in the background with his second marriage. As for Mary, further research will be required to follow her story post divorce.

Start your journey, explore our online indexes.


