Local History in the Community

Many of these items were found by MHS member Di Foster, purchased using your subscriptions and donations, and deposited with the Stonnington History Centre for safekeeping and secure access.

Facebook page attracting lots of interest!

Who remembers clock traffic lights? There was still one of these at the corner of High Street and Tooronga Road, Malvern around 1960. The clock traffic light, or Marshalite, was designed in 1936 by Australian Charles Marshall. The Marshalite signal consisted of dials facing each street at an intersection, with a rotating hand pointing to coloured sections that denoted whether traffic in either direction should proceed, prepare to stop, or stop, and how much longer that phase had to go. In later years they were combined with conventional traffic lights at intersections. Variations existed for pedestrian crossings, with additional text instructing people to "Walk" or "Don't Walk". Marshalite signals were phased out in the 1970s. (Wikipedia)

Rob Bower

Rob Bower was present at the first planning meeting for the formation of the Malvern Historical Society on 30 July 1972. Over the past fifty years, Rob, a former MHS Treasurer, has provided the Stonnington History Centre with detailed research relating to the former City of Malvern and the present City of Stonnington. His extensive research, always beautifully organised and presented, includes 'Malvern 1840-1989: A history of the subdivision', covering roads and streets, when the plans were lodged and declared, including Crown grants, and details of the General Law subdivision.

Rob's other research relates to material on Malvern trades and businesses, the development of rateable properties, maps of Malvern east of Burke Road, and an index to *The Australasian* (January to June 1894), and he recently donated an additional collection of his research notes, maps and real estate brochures. Rob received a Malvern Historical Society Certificate of Appreciation at our recent Malvern Historical Society 50+ years Morning Tea.

The Malvern Antique Fairs and High Street in Armadale

In September 1959, the first of the Malvern antique fairs was held at the Malvern Town Hall. Maybe three or four years later, I undertook my first visit. The 69 tram passed the door and I often caught it from Caulfield at weekends to visit school friends. There was always a vast display of material as antiques in those days were highly collectable – and expensive. The displays extended not only throughout the main hall but to two adjacent halls, to the left and right. A catalogue was supplied and I have found a few copies in my collection.

The antiques on display included vintage furniture (always vetted to ensure it was older than 100 years, often with a gold BADA seal, which would have ruled out almost all Victorian furniture in the early days), china, porcelain, pictures and so on. I sometimes met people there with whom I had been to school, and sometimes saw famous faces. My great aunt Berenice Bottomley was seen there with Lillian Wightman, a couturier, to whom I was introduced.

There was no way I could afford anything for many years as prices were very high indeed, best suited to residents of Melbourne suburb SE2. It wasn't until 1978 that I purchased a set of mahogany country Chippendale dining chairs from John Rosenberg, of Moorabool Antiques in Geelong. A few years later, I had to sell a Georgian dining table to Syd Broadway of Adam Antiques. I thought I had got a good price, but it was seen at a subsequent fair with a far higher asking price. As time went on, I could afford further small pieces, mainly blue and white china. I must have been to dozens of these fairs over the years. Sometimes they were held in the Royal Exhibition Building in Carlton, but filling that vast space was problematic.

One recalls that High Street in Armadale, just down the road from the Town Hall, was the epicentre of Melbourne's antique trade with many opulent shops lining either side. I recall Anne Blamires, whose shop had biblical texts hanging from the walls, and then Bill Johnston of Kent Antiques, whose shop I wasn't game to enter. Often the proprietor stood near the front entrance and glared at anyone passing through the door. In the late 1970s, container loads of antiques were arriving in Melbourne from Britain and I would sometimes sneak out from work at lunchtime to peruse what had arrived. I found a wonderful Georgian mahogany bow-fronted chest of drawers at what seemed to be a very affordable price. I paid for it by cheque but when it was delivered they said the price had been a mistake but would have to stick to the arrangement! More recently, I bought many delightful Victorian and Edwardian ceramic tiles from Granny's Market, in Armadale, which closed a few years ago. They were stored at the back in cardboard boxes and, rummaging through the (often dirty) material, one could find some examples of arts and crafts design from Minton, Wedgwood, et al.

Malvern Star

Edna James recently shared a photograph of her uncle and aunt, Charles and Rose Hurren. Charles and Rose can be seen setting off from Melbourne in 1948 to sell Malvern Star bicycles. Charles worked for Bruce Small and became a lifelong friend, eventually moving to the Gold Coast with Bruce, where he retired and built a home on the Isle of Capri. At one time Charles won a trip to the UK due to the number of successful sales he had achieved.

Henry Bournes Higgins

Barrister Henry Bournes Higgins purchased land in Glenferrie Road, on the corner of School Street (Stonnington Place) in 1883. Higgins became one of Australia's most radical lawyers and social reformers. Higgins was one of the Founders of Federation, a member of the Victorian and then the first Federal Parliament, a High Court judge and the second President of the Federal Court of Conciliation and Arbitration. Throughout his legal and political career, he was a recognised authority in Equity and Constitutional Law. He is perhaps best remembered as the maker of the historic Harvester Judgement, which set a minimum living wage for unskilled workers.

Doona, Higgin's two-storey mansion designed by architect William Salway, was built around 1885, prior to Henry's marriage to Mary Alice, the daughter of Dr George Morrison. Henry Higgins died in 1929 at Heronswood, the family's summer retreat at Dromana. Within a few months, Doona was sold, and soon after, the house was demolished.
